FROM THE DESK OF CATHRYN NAERA:

Kia ora koutou katoa.

This week we conclude our fundraising efforts for the schools in Wairoa. What an amazing community we are in, we thank you all for your generosity and support. Each event has been successful and has contributed to the funds we are raising. On Tuesday students from the Kahui Ako schools came together, at Mataatua Marae, to record a message and waiata for Wairoa Schools. This will accompany the koha which will be sent from our Kahui Ako. I was very proud to be with Maraea, Liam, Jetty and Billy who represented Ōhope Beach School at the marae.

Maths:

During February the children took part in a maths screening assessment which the teachers use to inform planning and teaching. This assessment covers the number components (whole numbers, addition & subtraction, multiplication and division and fractions) of maths which are the foundation for learning. There are many opportunities for you to promote maths at home while shopping, cooking, building to name a few. Basic fact knowledge supports your child's learning in maths and we encourage you to look for fun ways to promote this learning.

Playground Developments:

If you have been into school this week you will have seen the next stage of our playground development. We are building an outdoor learning space which will be available to classes or during break times. Children are often looking for a quiet spot to sit and read or draw and this will be available to them. We will also be installing some outdoor bench seating for the students and school community to use while making use of our facilities during school time or during the weekend. We are proud of our school environment and welcome its use by the community.

Thank you to Jared Torrington who has erected more secure safety fencing, to our field perimeter, while the board works on a more permanent solution to the subsidence along our fenceline. Over the weekend NZEI (the teachers union) members rejected the current offer from the government. They are now voting on strike action. It has not been confirmed yet, but NZEI are looking at striking in all NZ primary and intermediate schools on Thursday 16th March. This aligns with the current strike action for secondary teachers. As soon as we know if this is confirmed or not, we will let you know.
